Dear Friends,

What a wonderful year it has been! As I prepare for our annual workshop with our Board of Directors to review our Strategic Plan and goals for the next few years, I am reminded of all we have accomplished in the past two years but particularly in the past year. We have...

- Increased our program staff from one part-time manager to two full time managers.
- Hired a bookkeeper to replace the one we were borrowing from our friends at PalmettoPride.
- Hired two new Program Interns and a Marketing Intern.
- Recruited five new Board members, adding new areas of expertise, interests and diversity.
- Redesigned our website with a more attractive, easier to navigate version.
- Launched a new "Do Beautiful Things Midlands" campaign.
- Launched a YouTube page with educational and informative videos.
- Assembled litter lesson supply kits and lesson flash cards for School Resource Officers (SROs) to use to teach elementary school children.

In the next year, our team plans to...

- Continue working with School Resource Officers (SROs) to teach litter lessons in all elementary schools in Lexington and Richland counties.
- Install several "Greetings from" murals in many of the 19 municipalities we serve.
- Instate a volunteer litter crew to remove litter where and when needed.
- Continue increasing the number of volunteers and groups.

Our History

Keep the Midlands Beautiful was **established in 1989** by a "Leadership Columbia" class. While touring the Columbia airport, the group of professionals was dismayed by the amount of litter on the roadways and knew that a decrease in litter would increase economic development and tourism.

Keep the Midlands Beautiful is one of over 700 affiliates of Keep America Beautiful in the U.S. and one of 38 affiliates of PalmettoPride in South Carolina. While many affiliates are housed under a government entity, Soil and Water Commission, or Chamber of Commerce and serve one town/city or one county, Keep the Midlands Beautiful is a 501 (c) (3) non-profit and we are the only affiliate in the country that serves two counties.

We serve over 720,000 residents in Lexington and Richland counties which includes 19 towns/cities and Lake Murray, "the Jewel of the South." We have historically had two employees but have grown in recent years and now have three full-time employees, two part-time university interns, a part-time bookkeeper and we're hiring!


We manage

- One or two (1-2) large-scale beautification projects each year


And we provide environmental education for youth and adults.








Lake Sweep / River Sweep
